The American Council on Criminal Justice Training (ACCJT) is an IRS approved non-profit Public Safety Education and Training institution. It is our mission to provide education and training that enhances the public's safety. We fulfil our mission in two ways. First, by providing free public safety education presentations and training courses to educational institutions, members of the general public, private businesses, private and public organizations, and for profit and non-profit corporations in the following topics:

- Dealing Effectively with Hostility and Violence in the Workplace
- Child Safety and Abduction Resistance Education for Parents
- Citizen Personal Defense Spray Certification (Pepper Spray)
- Narcotics Awareness and Recognition for Citizens
- Child Safety and Abduction Resistance Education
- Personal Protection Strategies for Women
- Safety Strategies for Senior Citizens
- 911 Crime Reporting for Citizens
- Self-defense Tactics for Women

Secondly, we fulfill our mission by providing free or low cost training to criminal justice officers in:

- Responding to School Shooting
- Major Crimes Investigation
- Gang Crime Investigation
- Narcotics Investigation
- Community Policing
- Proper Use of Force
- Defensive Tactics
- Officer Survival

The ACCJT has two additional donation programs. ***The Police Dog Donation Program.*** In this program the ACCJT works in partnership with the state's law enforcement associations and the state's association of mayors to identify a police department or sheriff department that lacks the funding to purchase, equip, and train a patrol or narcotics detection police dog. In addition to providing the police dog to the law enforcement agency, the ACCJT provides the required safety equipment to provide on-going training for the K9. Businesses and corporations who donate to this fund receive recognition of their support at the public Donation Ceremony.

The second additional donation program is the ***Peace Officer Memorial Fund.*** In collaboration with the state's Chiefs of Police, Sheriff's, and Peace Officers associations, the ACCJT selects an officer who has fallen in the line of duty to recognize and memorialize that officer for his or her ultimate sacrifice for public safety. Donations to this fund are used to provide criminal justice training seminars, instructor courses, and an annual conference in the fallen officer's memory. In addition, the fund provides the surviving children of the officer with college scholarships. Businesses and corporations who donate to this fund receive recognition of their support at all the seminars, instructor courses, and at the annual conference.

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The ACCJT was founded in 2005 by Howard Webb. Mr. Webb has over twenty-three years of law enforcement experience. He is the former Director of the Montana Law Enforcement Academy. Prior to accepting the position in Montana, Mr. Webb held the rank of Lieutenant for Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST). While at DPSST, Mr. Webb managed the police-training program. Furthermore, he developed the training curriculums for defensive tactics, criminal investigations, liability management, survival skills, and use of force for the Oregon Public Safety Academy. During his eleven-year tenure at DPSST, Mr. Webb served as the police and corrections use of force and tactics expert for the State of Oregon, testifying in both state and federal courts.

Mr. Webb developed the first National Police Corp model for the U.S. Department of Justice. Furthermore, Mr. Webb provided use of force training to the two thousand officer, international police security force, at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. Currently, Mr. Webb serves as the ACCJT Executive Director.
