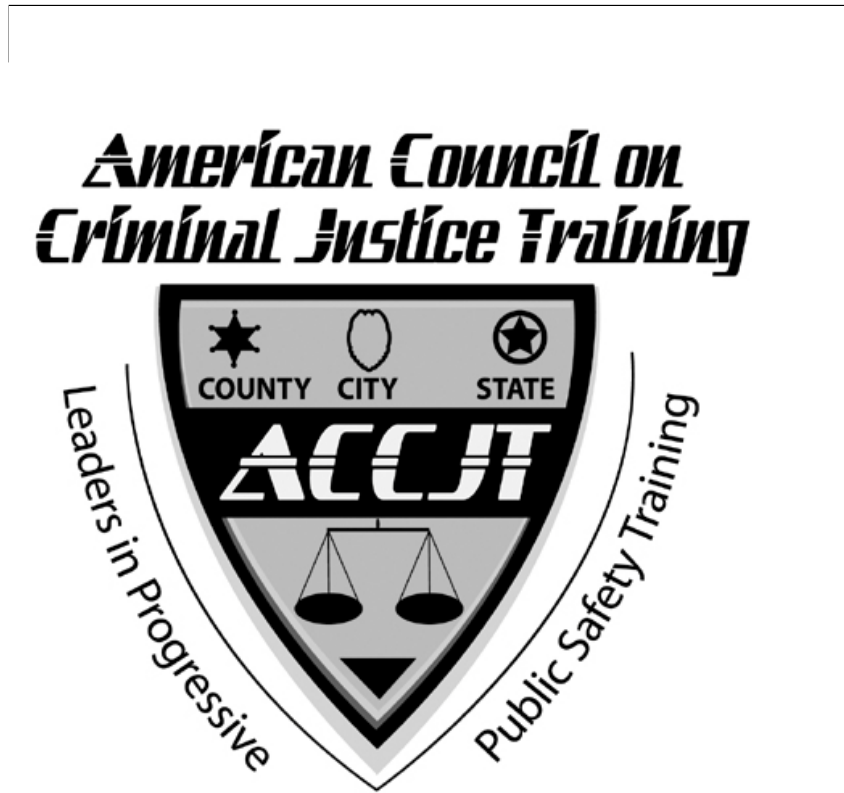

How to receive Training

The ACCJT provides training seminars and instructor development courses on an international and national basis. We provide both open enrollment and contract courses. The majority of our open enrollment courses are offered through a hosting law enforcement agency. As a hosting agency, you receive free training.

Please Note: It is ACCJT's policy that instructor certification courses are provided to law enforcement agencies on an official basis only. All participants must be departmentally sanctioned to attend.

Hosting a Program: As previously stated, most ACCJT courses are co-hosted by a sponsoring agency. The host agency agrees to provide a training location, distribute promotional material (provide by us), send out tele-type announcements, and submit the course information to P.O.S.T. for certification.

For hosting a Training Seminar, you will receive:

- Three free tuitions
- Two additional free tuitions, if the seminar is filled to capacity

For hosting an Instructor Course, you will receive:

- Two free tuitions
- Two additional free tuitions, if the course is filled to capacity

We require a minimum of twenty paid participants to provide the seminar or instructor course. The Maximum capacity for each course or seminar is listed in each program synopsis provided in this synopsis.

ACCJT Instructor Courses

Survival Skills Instructor Course Hours: Forty

Instructor certifications in four areas: Counter Assault Tactics, Weapon Retention and Disarming, Police Tactical Folding Knife, and Confrontational Simulation. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Law Enforcement Defensive Tactics Instructor Course Hours: Forty

Arrest and Control Tactics, Cooperative/High Risk Handcuffing, Counter Assault Tactics, Edged and Impact Weapon Defense, Ground Defense, Nylon Restraints, Pressure Points, Weapon Retention and Disarming, Police Tactical Folding Knife, Expandable Baton, and use of force. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Corrections Defensive Tactics Instructor Course Hours: Forty

Physical Control Tactics, Counter Assault Tactics, Edged Weapon Defense, Ground Defense, Weapon Retention and Disarming, Cell Extraction Tactics, Inmate Searches, and Transportation and Restraints. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Criminal Justice Instructor Development Course Hours: Forty

This is not a typical academic T-4-T Course. This course is developed specifically to train police, corrections, parole/probation officers, and 911 Tele-communicators. Information and training in classroom presentations, curriculum development, writing and developing testing instruments and motor skill labs, conducting motor skills training, and developing and conducting effective training simulations. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Simulation Instructor Course Hours: Sixteen

Information and training for designing and conducting safe and effective scenario and simulation training utilizing firearms training simulators, simulation protective equipment (Hitman, Redman, FIST) and/or marking cartridges and air-soft weapons. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Confrontational Simulation Instructor Course Hours: Twenty-four

This is the first nationally recognized scenario-based use of force training model. Information and training for creating and conducting effective scenario based use of force training, guidelines for integrating the use of deadly (marking ammunition) and non-deadly force options into role playing, simulations, and training scenarios. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Counter Assault Tactics Instructor Course Hours: Sixteen

Information and training for the use of personal weapons, defeating edged and impact weapon attacks, defeating body holds and grasps, and ground defenses. 83% of officer assaults occur with the assailant's hands, fists, or feet. This program prepares your officers for that sudden, violent attack on the street or correctional facility. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Weapon Retention and Disarming Instructor Course Hours: Sixteen

Techniques for retaining handguns and long-guns, techniques for disarming a suspect armed with a handgun or long-gun, and tactics for surviving an "Officer Hostage" situation. Approximately, 40% of the officers killed making arrest are killed with their own firearm. This program safely integrates the use of marking cartridges and air-soft weapons in disarming simulations. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Arrest and Control Tactics Instructor Course Hours: Sixteen

A complete training program in pain compliance control techniques and pressure points, the latest cooperative and high risk handcuffing techniques, and "Pat and Frisk" and intrusive clothing search techniques. Multi-officer control tactics are emphasized. Furthermore, this program offers guidelines for conducting safe and effective arrest and control tactics simulation training. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Corrections Control Tactics Instructor Course Hours: Sixteen

Training in correction specific pain compliance control techniques and pressure points, handcuffing and restraints, and intrusive clothing search techniques. Multi-officer control tactics that can be applied in a close quarter cell environment are emphasized. Furthermore, this program offers guidelines for conducting safe and effective control tactics simulation training. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Cell Extraction Team Instructor Course Hours: Sixteen

Information and training in creating and conducting two, four, and six officer cell extraction teams and conducting cell extraction simulation training. This program offers tactics for any size agency. Tactics for two or more officer teams are offered to meet the needs of the smallest police or sheriff's department. If your officers carry TFKs, they need training to minimize officer and department liability. You don't let your officers carry firearms without training; you shouldn't send them out to the street without TFK training. A complete instructor manual and PowerPoint presentation is provided.

Pepper Spray Instructor Course Hours: Eight

Information for selecting and implementing an OC aerosol restraint by a law enforcement officers. And, minimizing criminal and civil liability associated with the proper use of pepper spray as a law enforcement tool.
